Free Weekly Yoga

Bridging Stars provides classes that are designed as an opportunity for the ASU community to focus on strengthening their mind and body. By volunteering their certified yoga instructor, Bridging Stars has made the program inclusive to all, helping build greater connectivity in the community. The sessions have allowed students, faculty, and staff to connect to themselves in a new way, harmonizing their mind and body through disciplined yoga practice.

Respect Movement

The Respect Movement's commitment to creating a culture of respect on ASU's campus not only benefits those directly involved within Man Up and WoW Factor, but the Sun Devil community as a whole. One of the greatest aspects of the Respect Movement is that it equips students with the skills and tools they need to foster positive change within the ASU community, making the opportunities for positive cultural change virtually unlimited due to the different areas of influence these students are able to impact at Arizona State University and beyond.

World AIDS Day

World AIDS Day created safe spaces, held discussions, and educated students about the prevalence and stigma about HIV/AIDS. This was the first of its kind at ASU to truly integrate creative ways to educate college students on this issue and push students to have better conversations about HIV/AIDS. World AIDS Day was created with health and wellness at the forefront, but is long lasting because of the education it spread.

OUTSTANDING SUSTAINABLE PROJECT/PROGRAM FINALISTS

Honor Society for Sustainability

The Honor Society for Sustainability (HSS) created a week-long series of events focused on educating students about the COP 21 conference happening in Paris. This annual conference brings leaders from all over the world together to discuss climate change mitigation and adaptation plans and goals. The HHS is composed of full-time students to share information about climate change within the community.

Micro Air Vehicles

The Micro Air Vehicle Club gives students the opportunity to have an intellectual discussion about what engineers do. High school students are able to choose an engineering major they are interested in based on all the engineers discussions they had over the six-week program. Every professional / PhD / working engineer speak for 5 minutes on what they do at their respective company.

FINALISTS

5th Annual TaylorFest

TaylorFest is an annual block party that takes place right before the Fall semester begins. This event is a key part of the Sun Devil experience as it allows students the opportunity to interact at an event that is inclusive to various interests during a crucial time: ASU Welcome Week. Residents can socialize with new and returning students, find out about student organizations, and meet local vendors from downtown Phoenix.

6th Annual Mr. Taylor Place Pageant

Mr. Taylor Place is an annually held non-traditional pageant where male residents in the Taylor Place community spend a week fundraising for a nonprofit organization and then compete on the night of the event in a three-part pageant to be named Mr. Taylor Place. This year, the contestants spent the week before the pageant fundraising for United Way. Each contestant was able to choose which cause within the United Way to support: Ensuring Children & Youth Succeed, Ending Hunger & Homelessness, or Increasing the Financial Stability of Families/Individuals.

International Night

International Night is an annual cultural event aimed at exposing the student community of ASU to different cultures. The main attraction of the event was the 22 cultural performances from various nationalities. More than 1700 attendees enjoyed interactive activities hosted by 35 clubs including: henna tattoo, cultural games and activities.

Sun Devil Survivor

Sun Devil Survivor (SDS), is a three-day outdoor competitive event that is put on by the Respect Movement, made up of the clubs Man Up and WoW Factor. The event helps to promote a healthy active lifestyle, team unity, creative problem-solving, and positive sportsmanship as tribes interact with each other. SDS gives students who are experiencing culture shock from their transition to ASU a positive environment and safe atmosphere to readjust and refocus before the academic year kicks off.

RESIDENTIAL COLLEGE OF THE YEAR FINALISTS

Center Residential Community

Center Residential Community is a unique union of Residential Colleges that actively fosters a culture of social and community awareness, academic achievement, and genuine concern for others. This community is shared between the Herberger Institute for Design and the College of Health Solutions. This element creates a dynamic relationship among students in the Center Community: with it, comes an understanding that while not every resident living in Center belongs to one academic college, residents are united by virtue of being Sun Devils.

College of Health Solutions

The Residential College Student Leaders go above and beyond to connect with College of Health Solutions students, ask what they want to see and what they want to know, and they make it happen. PITCHFORK LEGACY AWARD DERRICK HALL

President & CEO: Arizona Diamondbacks

A native of Los Angeles, Hall received a bachelor's degree in broadcasting and journalism from Arizona State University, where he is also a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity. Hall also received a master's degree from Ohio University in sports administration. In 2012, he received an honorary Doctorate degree from the University of Phoenix. He was inducted into the ASU Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Mass Communications Alumni Hall of Fame in 2002 and was awarded the ASU Young Alumni Achievement Award in 2003. In 2006, Ohio University's Sports Administration Program recognized Hall as the 25th recipient of the Charles R. Higgins Distinguished Alumnus Award. Hall was the keynote speaker for ASU's Cronkite school convocation in December 2008, becoming the first Cronkite alum to deliver a commencement speech at the school's graduation and also spoke at the W.P. Carey School of Business and the University of Phoenix convocations in 2012.



Hall joined the D-backs in May 2005 as Senior Vice President, Communications and served in numerous capacities prior to being named president in September 2006 and adding the title of CEO in January 2009.

His philanthropic efforts led to Hall being named the APS Peacemaker Award at Valle del Sol's Profiles of Success, the Bill Shover Leadership Award from United Blood Services and the Phoenix Award by the Phoenix Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) in 2013. He was the inaugural recipient of the Goldwater Community Service Award in 2012 by the Active 20-30 Club of Phoenix. In 2007, he was named to the Phoenix Business Journal's "Forty Under 40" class, was the recipient of the "Community Lifeline Award" from Teen Lifeline and was named the Phoenix Father's Day Council "Father of the Year" to benefit the American Diabetes Association. The SportsBusiness Journal added him to its prestigious "Forty Under 40" class in 2008. The Phoenix Business Journal also named Hall to its inaugural list of "Most Admired CEOs" in 2009. Hall is also a member of the ASU W.P. Carey School of Business "Dean's Council of 100," Young Presidents' Organization and the Thunderbirds.

CHANGEMAKER AWARD FOR GROUP SERVICE FINALISTS

Interfraternity Council & Panhellenic Council

Interfraternity Council & Panhellenic Council's event "Shop with a Cop" was a partnership between ASU Police Department, Tempe Police Department, and the Interfraternity Council & Panhellenic Council. Leaders from both student organizations assisted with a breakfast for local children, and went to Wal-Mart where they helped each child pick out toys to make their holiday season wish come true.

Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy

Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project (MBCLP) enables second- and third year ASU College of Law students to teach South Mountain High School students about a variety of constitutional issues, in addition to assisting the students in sharpening their appellate and oral advocacy skills. Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project impacts not only high school students, but also the law students who put in weekly hours to coach the students and the law students who donate a whole day's time to judge, critique, and provide feedback to the high school students regarding their oral argument skills.

Nonprofit Leadership Alliance Student Association

The NLASA provides the community with services for improvement and care, along with benefiting students that are enrolled in the Certified Nonprofit Professional program. NLASA made fleece blankets at BioScience High School for cancer patients with YANA (You Are Not Alone) - Cancer Comfort.

SPARKS

SPARKS services the entire Phoenix K-12 community by providing higher education advocacy to students that are from low income and minority based areas. SPARKS has grown from 250 member to close to 800 and have the goal of reaching 1000 by the end of the semester. SPARKS mission is to ensure that those who did not feel they were qualified for college know that there are opportunities available to mitigate adversities such as money, disability, etc.

Natima Neily

Natima is the Executive Director of Collegetown@ASU which is a student organization that seeks to build a stronger sense of community among ASU students through a vision of tolerance and inclusiveness, and inspire students to become positive change makers both at ASU and in the wider community. Natima led a group of 60 ASU students to camp Sky in Prescott for a 3 day conference where they engaged in important leadership activities and discussed important issues including: racism, gender equality, and how individuals can work together to tackle those issues.

Sun Devils Are Better Together

Sun Devils Are Better Together creates positive change within ASU and the surrounding community by promoting tolerance, peace, and cultural understanding. Sun Devils Are Better Together (SunDABT) continually brings students and community members together to reach across lines of difference, form community, and gain a deeper understanding of each other's worldviews. Humanity X


